Our fourth quarter is well under way with lots to keep the kindergarten and first grade class busy and enjoying our time together. We have recently made crosses to display at St. John's Easter breakfast. Our 'Changes' science unit is now wrapped up. We got to learn a little about the states of matter and physical and chemical changes. We saw steel rust, made eggs bounce, had fast-expanding vinegar and baking soda solutions, and grew crystal eggs. Throughout all of our experiments, we learned to make predictions and observations, recording our findings as we went. Our next unit will give more opportunities for observations and recordings as we examine plants- including their life cycle, parts, needs, and more.

In our Superkids (English Language Arts) class, we have been talking a lot about smoothing out our reading and adding expression to our voices. Kindergarten had the chance to try reading parts of a play to the preK friends, which was a good warm up for Grandparent's Day. We are planning on having an inperson Grandparent's Day for grades K-8. Our two grades will each be putting on their own play based on a favorite picture book. Parents are not expected to make costumes, though parts may be sent home for extra practice if your student is having a hard time learning their words.
